I know that my family and I will slide from the emotionally and spiritually charged joy of Easter on Sunday right into the work of Monday. Beaufort County public school kids go back to school Monday morning. Folks go back to work. Life goes on.



But first, thank you. Holy week has been all the better because of your willing, loving hearts. So many of you have volunteered to read, have sung in our cantata, helped and participated in our Lenten experience that included an Easter Egg Hunt, and been readers and communion servers for Maundy Thursday, changed the paraments to white, put out and arranged the flowers, made everyone audible, lit candles, dimmed lights and prepared communion. It has been glorious and an honor to serve with you.

I wanted to mention that on Maundy Thursday, it was especially meaningful that we drank the juice from olive wood cups from Bethlehem. With war between Israel and Hamas in Gaza shattering lives and hopes for better days, I looked in the cup, and I remembered Jesus asking, "Can you drink the cup I am going to drink?" He wanted to know if the disciples could be faithful in hard times.





These are not easy days.

The work of the Church includes the General Conference for which we have been waiting since 2020. Decisions, large and small, will be made there that impact our local church more than any General Conference since 1968 when the Methodist Episcopal Church merged with the United Brethren to become the United Methodist Church.

I am not among those who were elected to serve as delegates to General Conference. (That election was in 2019 in anticipation of 2020, which has been on hold because of Covid.) Although I have neither voice nor vote at the General Conference level, I determined to apply to be a volunteer. I was accepted and will be in attendance for just a few of the days.

But maybe I am getting ahead of myself. On April 14 at 2:00, we will gather in the sanctuary and I will do my best to explain How We Got Here and What is Before General Conference. No, it will not be live streamed or recorded. Sensitive conversations need to happen in person, and nuance and sensitivity are too easily lost in cyberspace.





The sweet lyrics of this Gaither hymn take on so much more meaning after the celebration of Christ's resurrection. But before we could reach the empty tomb we had to live through Holy Week. We had to listen as the crowd shouted "Hosanna!" one moment and "Crucify Him!" the next. We had to watch as beloved Jesus was welcomed with waving palms and then crowned with thorns. We had to travel with Jesus down that dark path that led to his death on the cross and burial in the tomb. But Easter morning came and we heard shouts of "Hallelujah!" We witnessed the stone being rolled away and the tomb being empty. Those early followers of Christ could have sang "Because He Lives" with great amazement and joy.

But the good news isn't just that Jesus lived then, but that He still lives in us today. That's why this Gaither song is in present tense: Because He <u>lives</u>. Because the temple curtain was torn in two and we were invited to live in God's presence again, Jesus is alive with us. Are you living today in a way that shows Jesus is still alive? Is your life different because He lives?

Spring is the time of renewal and rebirth and the gardens are our yearly proof of that. Each re-emerging perennials, especially the Easter lilies, reminds us of Jesus's resurrection. During the recent Lenten Experience as a reminder of Jesus's time in Gethsemane, we toured several of the front gardens which are providing Spring color.

The Sanctuary Gardens have been planted with yellow snapdragons and purple pansies to replace the early season daffodils. Color is also apparent around the church signboard as the Sweet Williams return and play off the red cyclamens which begin to peek out in late winter.

Along Allen Street, camellias, which have been blooming since winter, play off the red azaleas. The Lantana Garden and the White Garden will soon put on a display of Easter lilies. In the Office Gardens, we await the buds of the blue hydrangeas.
