### **History Corner**

#### Notes from Tales from Bluffton's Past: Forensic Architecture at Campbell Chapel AME

Presentation by James McGhee, Preservation Architect & Greg Jacobs, Preservation Contractor told the story of the renovation project currently underway in that historic building was held o Tuesday, April 29, 2025.

Earlier this spring, Gary Taylor, Al & Dian Litster and Michael & Diane Ciba attended this presentation at the Campbell Chapel, where we were invited to walk through the old church and view the progress of its restoration.

First a little history: Built in 1853, the Chapel was in the Okatie Mission (which later became The Bluffton Mission) of the South Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church. This mission was described in 1855 as "serving the plantations lying in St. Luke's Parish between Grahamville and Bluffton."

In1858, Rev. Samuel Leard was assigned to the Bluffton Mission. By 1860, he had grown the church to 38 white members, and 211 enslaved persons with a Sunday School that had 5 teachers with 40 white scholars and 400 enslaved scholars.

During the burning of Bluffton in 1863, a fire was set in the chancel, but the building was saved by quick action on the part of a few Confederate soldiers.

By 1875, many white members from Bluffton had joined with Methodists from Pritchardville to purchase St. Luke's Episcopal Church (currently St. Luke's United Methodist.) The building on Boundary Street was purchased for \$500 by a congregation of freedmen and became part of the Reconstruction Era African Methodist Episcopal (AME) Conference.

To get a sense of what the building was like in the 1860s, the current restoration team pointed out the following architectural details that have been uncovered during their project:




Here the outlines of the original pews show that the seats are about 13 inches from the floor. The present-day presenters suggested that the pews most likely had cushions.

As the building grew and changed, pieces of the original pews were changed and used in

## **History Corner**



The chancel was expanded several times. The original space only had the slight platform where the presenter is standing. A raised section was later added, with the choir loft added in a later expansion. Seen in this picture: the presenters, Greg Jacobs and James McGhee.

There were doors beneath a couple of the original windows that would open into the church. When the top "paned" portion of the window was "open", a person could then walk out through those doors as needed (to visit the necessary...) There was one set of doors on each side of the building.






Notches along the walls indicate that the back of the church had an upper gallery. This may have been where enslaved people stood during worship. There are also marks on a window frame that suggest there was a staircase along the north wall, indicating how folks may have gotten to this balcony/upper gallery.

The height of the original floor was determined by observing the slots on the outside of the building. This image also shows those slots cut into the exterior slats on the north side of the building. This image also shows the window that also acted as a door, from the outside of the building



As I drove by the church today, some of the siding on the exterior north wall has been removed. Watching the restoration process and discovering new information, we hope to learn more about the history of our church and the Bluffton community. 
