In a recent article, Rev. Magrey DeVega cited a study listing the top 5 things people give up for Lent. They were: 1) social networking, 2) chocolate, 3) Twitter, 4) alcohol and 5) chips. One year I gave up Facebook. One year I gave up candy, cookies, cake and ice cream. Neither was particularly edifying. In fact, the longer I went without a cookie, the less holy I felt. One year, I decided to take something on instead. That year, I took on Encouragement, and I set a

goal of daily encouragement. I chose a person each day and made a point to call or write a card with an encouraging message. That Lent, I felt closer to God and closer to God's people. It was right for me, and I have continued that as my Lenten discipline for a few years. In fact, now I look forward to it.

However, Rev. DeVega went on in the article to speak of 10 things we could give up for Lent. Some are:

- The need to be right all of the time
- Comparing ourselves to others
- The need to have it all figured out
- Fear of the future
- The need to be in control

All of these resonated with me. I do not know how we give up these things, but I know we should, and I know prayer and God's Word help. (This week, careful reading of Isaiah chapter 40 has been very helpful.)

Right now, many of us are worried about our nation and its politics and policies. We are concerned about the future of our church. We are very disquieted about the expanding situation in the Middle East, the plans North Korea seems to be making, what is going on in China, and the farmers who are protesting in France. Just typing this makes me feel all nervous and gueasy.

So, there are 3 things I am doing.

<u>First, pray and read scripture</u>. Last Sunday, Dean Loftin reminded me of a verse that I am holding close: Matthew 24:6, in which Jesus says: "You will hear of wars and rumors of wars, but see to it that you are not alarmed. Such things must happen, but the end is still to come." and I remember Jesus' promise to always be with us (Matthew 28:20)

<u>Secondly, turn off the news</u>. 24-hour news is not healthy; it raises anxiety. Turn off news notifications on phones, tablets, and computers. I am setting myself the limit I need to be informed and stopping there.

<u>Finally, be choosy about sources</u>. We all know people, news media and celebrities that thrive on inciting others' fears. Concerning the church, I mentioned last Sunday that General Conference (the worldwide body of the UMC) will be meeting in April/May. There are MANY decisions to be made, and much legislation to be sorted. Over 1000 petitions are presently on the docket to be sorted, matched etc. You can read these yourself.

There are specific ideas and petitions about regionalization. No one knows how that might play out, but you can look at it by clicking <u>Here</u>.



### STEPHEN MINISTRY



The Stephen Ministry Team recently read the book, *The Gift of Empathy, Helping Others Feel Valued, Cared For, and Understood,* by Joel P. Bretscher and Kenneth C. Haugk. The book was written to help people understand the purpose and need for empathy in this world. We Stephen Ministers continually use empathy in our work. The final section of the book is titled, "A World Filled with Empathy." It is worth sharing... "When someone who is hurting tells another person about their struggles, they're most likely to get a fix-it solution, a pep talk, a platitude, a dismissive remark, a story about someone else's suffering, or some other unhelpful response, when what they really want and need is empathy."

The question then became, "what if we could live in a world where everyone's go -to form of relating was empathy? What if empathy became the natural mode of relating in your family, social group, church, school, workplace, neighborhood and entire community?"

What is empathy? It is when one takes a moment to listen, feel our hurt, and show that they truly get it and care about what we're going through. Empathy is a power we all have within us, and tapping into it is simple. Becoming more empathetic means becoming more attuned to other people's feelings or holding back on sharing your own story when someone else is in the spotlight. "Empathy is looking at the world from someone else's perspective to experience what the person is feeling - and then expressing your understanding of those feelings to that person."

The key to empathizing is listening. You have to listen to the person who is hurting in order to understand what they are going through. Then, you respond by putting what they said into your own words and stating back what you heard them say. That way, you show that you were listening carefully and are trying to understand how they are feeling. All of this should be done through the lens of Christ's love. By that we mean letting His love shine through you.

The book covers guidelines for empathizing with someone close to you - a spouse or significant other, with children, with parents, with siblings, with friends, and in the workplace. It is easy reading and totally based on research done by the Stephen Ministry Organization.



A corporate holiday calls us to show our signs of affection with velvet heart boxes of chocolate, shiny jewelry, and fancy dinner dates, yet God calls us to remember our sinful nature and impending death. How do we hold these two events together?

I'm reminded of the hymn, "What Wondrous Love Is This" (UMH 292) which sings

God doesn't ask for perfection, He asks for relationship. But our own sin widens the gap between us and God. The only way we can draw closer is by acknowledging our sinful ways and repenting. As we receive God's grace, though undeserved, we strengthen our relationship with God. It is in the midst of our ashes, that God's love makes us brand new. So perhaps Valentine's Day and Ash Wednesday go together after all.



Other Words for Home: A Newbery Honor Award Winner by Jasmine Warga

A creatively written YA novel in verse, this book is about a young girl who must leave Syria to move to the United States. When events in her hometown become volatile, Jude and her mother are sent to live in Cincinnati with relatives. At first, everything in America seems too fast and too loud. But this new life brings unexpected surprises: new friends, a whole new family, a school musical for which she might try out. This lyrical, life-affirming story is about losing and finding home and, most importantly, finding yourself.

## **History Corner**

You see it every Sunday, but what do you know about the stained-glass window behind the choir loft? Well, here's some information for you.

The chancel window, designed and executed for the Bluffton United Methodist Church by the Willet Studio, has a figure of Jesus in the center. He opens His arms in invitation saying. "Come unto me, all ye that labor and are heavy laden and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you..." (Mathew 11:28. 29).

A yoke is enclosed in a diamond shaped panel at His feet. He stands superimposed upon a cross; not hanging on to it, but its presence is there. In the cross arms are the alpha and omega, first and last letters of the Greek alphabet. He said, "I am the alpha and omega, the beginning and the ending." (Revelation 1:8).

At top is another symbol derived from the book of Revelation; the lamb holds a white banner with a red cross which is the banner of the victory of life over sin and death.

The background is composed of a decorative vine forming medallions ornamented with leaves and bunches of grapes. "I am the vine, ye are the branches" (John 15:5).

Here people are representative of those who labor, those who are bur-dened and sick and a family group.
